Freemasons Deliver Christmas Cheer

Wisbech Freemasons supported by the Charity for Care and Relief and the Masonic Charitable Foundation donate £1000 to the Rosmini Centre Wisbech Foodbank.

Working with Local Schools, Health Care Providers, Children and Family Centres, the Rosmini Centre Wisbech provides food to families who are experiencing difficult times in their lives.

It collects and redistributes approximately 1,200 kilos of food that would have otherwise gone to landfill and has 40-50 people collecting food on a daily basis to provide around 250 food parcels each month.

The Centre also runs a number of activities and events to support those in need and provides Information, Advice and Guidance (IAG) to members of the local communities; this has become particularly important during the recent Covid pandemic became particularly important, as it was the only Community Building in Wisbech to have remained open throughout that period.

After a long period of consultation the Lodge of Three Grand Principles No. 441 has voted to move its Installation meeting from January to February, to cease having a January meeting altogether and to resurrect its May meeting. This past twelve months has reminded us all, the demands on Charity and in particular the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) 'our own Freemasons 'Charity, does not abate.

Throughout this Pandemic, our Provincial Charity, Care and Relief with the assistance of the MCF, have channeled, vital support and aid to where it has been needed most within our Province.

The 'Festival System' in Freemasonry is the feeder of funds into the MCF to enable it to function and distribute accordingly, hence the importance of our Festival 2023 Appeal launched by the Provincial Grand Master in March 2018 with the aim of providing a contribution of £900,000 to the MCF.

We all look forward to 2022, with the prospect of enjoying our Freemasonry in a more fuller sense, however it is important to reflect on our Festival journey achievements during the past twelve months in times of the unprecedented difficulties, when members of Lodges and Chapters have been meeting only with average attendances of 30% in comparison to pre Covid 19 lockdown. The lack of members meeting the physical Alms collection and participation in raffles have impacted on income into the festival.

With the Provincial Grand Masters' recent 'Soft' Relaunch of Festival 2023 Appeal at the meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge, marked with 'Cambridge Blue' Provincial Merchandise, In true 'Cambridgeshire Spirit', members, Lodges and Chapters have rallied around in donating in excess £ 122,515.59 towards the Festival 2023 during 2021

The importance of active Rpp's Regular Payment promises or Direct debit income during 2021 in the midst of the pandemic, (providing almost 50%) of the yearly income is clearly illustrated in these figures, It demonstrates also the importance for Lodges and Chapters to pay over available funds as early as possible to gain Notional interest.** £35,193.47 is not an insignificant sum !!
